

Do your research on the smaller sized Yorkies....

Is that ultra-tiny really suited to you?

I sound like a broken record I am sure but if you are wanting that TINY, teensy little yorkie you must know what it entails to own such a tiny.

We advise anyone interested in this size pup and future dog, that it is normally a 100% companion dog to its owner. It may go to members of the immediate family when out of the owner's arms, but those eyes rarely stray from the dog's actual owner. PUPPY included. They are not a family dog as such, more designed as the ultimate companion for the ULTIMATE owner. Yes within a family unit, they will be very happy PROVIDED no small kiddies to drop them or manhandle them and please NOT to tramp on them as that could be the end.

Often people ask me how do I not stand on them, well they are not stupid they usually keep out of harm's way, but when kiddies, run around, jump off of furniture if that pup or dog is around, could be the end of it.

The reason that most people wanting this sized dog - wait for the kids to grow up.

We do not sell to people with kiddies, MOM will say " but I will help, it will be my dog or the child will think it is their dog but it is actually my dog" Sending mixed signals to a pup and dog is not the best either NOT this sized dog. These dogs bond and bond very strongly in most cases with ONE person. They are not kid's dogs, teenagers or student's dogs. Young folk go out and live it up. These pups/dogs cannot go out to Pubs, the flicks you name it, all the more reason they are suited to adults who have done the playing around bit, who are at home most of the time, people whose family have grown up and left home etc. Ladies who are home executives etc. This is similar to having a human baby. It means pyjama drill as well, these tinies eat during the night are monitored during the night. THIS IS THE GENUINE TEACUP. If no Pyjama drill is required it is NOT a proper teacup pup.

There is a tremendous amount of negativity out there regarding the teacup dog and often the public ask me, is this in fact the truth or a story?

IT is indeed sad to say very much the truth. So many breeders out there sell off pups as teacup dogs, it happened to someone I know who was getting tired of being on a waiting list with me, bought elsewhere. Thousands paid out for a teacup, the pup in question visited the vet on a good few occasions. The pup was dead one day short of her owning it, two weeks down the line.

The pup in question did not eat well at all, etc. However this is NOT for me to elaborate on. DO YOUR HOMEWORK.

We do not sell our dogs at 6 and 8 weeks and even 10 weeks of age. Years back we did but found that not to be too good an idea. The majority of the public coped, but the odd person did not.

Our teacups leave here at four months of age, at the earliest. At this age we can see they are the GENUINE TINY. They are fully inoculated, meaning they have had three shots at monthly intervals plus rabies. They are micro chipped. They will be registered. They carry health guarantees and they are all sterilized shortly before leaving us.

We therefore take the risk of the anesthetic. To date we have never had an issue with this, however having said this, my own vet has been sterilizing tinies of mine for the last 15 years. He has worked on adult teacups dogs of mine weighing as little as 550 - 600 and 700gms.

We do as much as possible to ensure that pup and its future owner are well on their way to a very long and happy future together. We do not expect any of our pups to frequent a vet on a regular basis, NO different with the tinies. The majority will only see a vet for annual shots and dentals. However if my own vet advises not to sell a pup to the public as it is really small, we will not sell that pup. If the vet feels the public will not cope, we listen to his recommendation.

There is NO reason why a tiny should not live every bit as long a life as a normal sized yorkie. One of our Yorkies passed a matter of a couple of

months back at the ripe old age of 19 years. Perfectly healthy till the last day. Just lay down and said GOODBYE world.

You do have to have the lifestyle to own a TINY and it is not a pup or dog that can be left home with the Maid or Granny. Once in a blue moon fine, but not on a regular basis.

Not a dog suited to kenneling, it will pine and end up a dead dog. Not suited to be left home on annual vacations, again ask yourself, is this what I want, what I can cope with?

If you take the time and trouble, a tiny can be taught to go in a handbag and not misbehave at all. Trust me I have done it for many years.

I think a lot of folk get caught up in the glamour of owning this mouse sized dog, however we have waiting lists, have had waiting lists for years already and this sized dog does not appear on a regular basis. So if you want a “mijoy” baby you will have a fairly long wait. This way is also of benefit to ourselves as we know anyone who is prepared to wait for the right dog, in most cases is the right owner.

Teacup pups are not bred from TEACUP PARENT DOGS nor are they bred from POCKET sized PARENT DOGS. Our mother dogs are the normal breeding sized females that fall into the category known as MINIATURE meaning an adult weight dog of 2.5 – 3.5kg fully grown.

We **do not** manipulate the way our teacups are produced, they are produced as nature intended. NO interbreeding, NO breeding with small sized dogs.

Our Dads in most cases are smaller but not teacup or small pockets either. The smaller the dog, the more useless it is at siring. TINIES are pet's - end of story.

We are not cage breeders either. Our own dogs and their offspring live a very good life.

ALL our pups are hand raised, home raised, handled from birth numerous times a day.

We will guarantee our pups will have superb temperaments.

We do not breed pups by the dozen, we breed QUALITY not QUANTITY.
We breed robust, solid built, pups with good conformation. We do not breed long legged, low weight large sized dogs.

Should you require any further information you are most welcome to contact me... I have discouraged many a future buyer from buying that TINY, it is far better to be informed as to what is involved than to buy with ZERO knowledge.

Please remember the genuine teacup is a rare dog. The majority of teacups advertised are NOT teacup sized dogs.
